- Since 1983 Christmas in Action has been putting "Life back into the homes and families of Wichita County with thousands of supportive contractors and dedicated volunteers from all over the community by unselfishly repairing the homes of low income elderly, disabled and veteran homeowners in Wichita County.
 All work is done free of charge to homeowners who qualify.
 All of our applicants are either physically and/or financially unable to make the necessary repairs themselves. Most of our applicants depend solely on Social Security for income. With the increased costs of utilities, food, and medication there is little money left over for home maintenance.

- Average income \$700 a month
 Projects are completed all year long and urgent repairs like loss of heat, water heaters, gas lines, plumbing repairs and roofs are accessed and completed as soon as possible.

Financial Report of Christmas in Action...

- Christmas in Action is a volunteers based non-profit organization with an annual budget of \$206,000.
 Currently the CIA owns the 1000 block of MLK and our main location at 1113 Sheppard Access Rd.
 Our main location has 12, 231 sq. ft. and 6 1/2 acres; enough room for training, workshops, storage, events and fundraisers.
- 2020 has been an interesting year. We have completed 62 contractor services totaling over \$115,000 and 4 volunteer projects completed by family members
 We have not been able to have our annual fundraisers this year and help is definitely needed to continue our mission.
 We tentatively have our "Smokin in Action BBQ Cook off scheduled for September 25-26th of this. In conjunction this year we will host a Trade Day with vendors of all kinds, with food trucks and a Cajun People's Choice Award.

REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY

North Central Texas Community Health Care Center, Inc., doing business as Community Healthcare Center, opened its doors in 1994 as a 501c(3) private, not-for-profit and charitable organization. The Center provides access to high-quality, affordable medical, dental and counseling services. Patients benefit from various healthcare services including pediatrics, obstetrics, family medicine, behavioral health counseling, dental care and a TodayCare walk-in clinic. Additional benefits for Center patients include low-cost pharmaceuticals, laboratory, x-ray and more.

In 2019, Community Healthcare Center served over 31,000 patients with over 108,000 visits. Patients were seen by great clinicians at our six clinical sites located in north Texas, which is expanding in 2020.

In 2020, Community Healthcare Center is looking forward to opening the first two school-based health centers in north Texas. Community Healthcare Center at Zundy will be located at 2412 Avenue H directly behind Zundy Elementary. This school-based clinic will take care of those elementary age students that need a medical visit during the school day. In addition, the clinic will be open to the community for medical and behavioral health counseling visits.

Community Healthcare Center at Vernon is the second school-based health center slated to open in late 2020. This clinic is located at the backside of Vernon College off of Maplewood Avenue in Wichita Falls. Providers at this clinic would see Vernon College students, staff and their families for medical and behavioral health counseling. Additionally, healthcare services at this health center would be open to the entire community.

The future of Community Healthcare Center continues to look bright with growth because of the communities that support us in our efforts to provide access to high quality, respectful and patient-centered primary and preventive healthcare services to everyone.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP WICHITA FALLS Youth Leadership is a joint project between Leadership Wichita Falls and the Wichita Falls Independent School District Partners in Education program. Since 1993, the Youth Leadership program has afforded local youths the opportunity to enthusiastically embrace a journey to promote their personal growth while empowering them to realize the need for positive change and involvement within our community.

NONPROFIT MANAGEMENT MINOR

The Nonprofit Management Minor is designed to create a pipeline of trained nonprofit leaders into the nonprofit and business sector. As a signature minor this program is applicable to a range of degrees at MSU Texas and adds relevance and marketability to our graduates.

The Dillard College of Business Administration, an 88,000 square foot facility enhanced with state of the art instructional technology, is the home of the Nonprofit Management Minor. Three core courses comprise the foundation of nonprofit leadership and management knowledge and count for 9 hours toward the 15-hour minor.

Sonia White earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts from the University of Texas at Austin, and earned a Master's in Fine Arts Administration and Supervision from Bank Street College and Parson's School of Design in New York City, NY. White has spent more than 15 years in management, executive leadership and consulting within the social sector.

THE Kitchen has been feeding the elderly, disabled, and homebound for 53 years, with 5 programs: Meals on Wheels, Red Door Senior Center, Green Door Senior Center, Kid's Meals

Program, and AniMEALS.

- **Meals on Wheels** has over 1060 clients and continues to grow. Seven meals a week are delivered by volunteers, to clients and their pets, on 57 routes. Recipients also receive a wellness check daily. If someone does not answer the door, we know why before 5:00pm. We serve the frail and vulnerable. Most live below the poverty level on an average income of \$658 monthly, have more than one disability, and are unable to leave their homes.
- **Red Door Senior Center**, 1000 Burnett, has served up to 250 meals daily. Due to COVID-19, we provide meals to seniors 60 years and older through a drive-up program Monday Friday.
- **Green Door Senior Center**, at the MLK Center on Smith Street, has served up to 60 seniors daily. Meals are currently provided to seniors 60 years and older through a drive-up program Monday – Friday.
- **Kid's Meals Program.** Meals on Wheels offers delivery to homebound children with disabilities and their caregivers. We also cater the Wichita Falls Area Food Bank's Kid's Café. Approximately 9,000 meals are prepared monthly for children to enjoy.
- AniMEALS feeds dogs or cats of Meals on Wheels clients. Recipients now enjoy a complete meal instead of sharing portions of their lunch with their furry companions.



Wichita Adult Literacy Council 2019 Report

The Wichita Adult Literacy Council (WALC) exists to help those in our community find a way out of their circumstances by providing one-to-one tutoring or small group instruction, free of charge.

In 2019, WALC provided over 7,000 hours of tutoring in all literacy areas.

In North Texas: 20% of adults cannot read. 16% never graduated high school ~ 8.5% less than 9th grade. Of those living at poverty level, 25.78% didn't graduate from high school. 39.4% of the unemployed never graduated from high school. The Wichita Adult Literacy Council was founded in 1982 and works to Bend the Trend of Literacy in Wichita Falls. Our volunteer tutors provide a variety of learning opportunities to our adult students, all free of charge. WALC's tutors provide small group instruction and one-on-one tutoring in a wide range of disciplines. All of WALC's revenue comes from donations; fundraisers, grants & foundations, and individual contributions.

THE WICHITA COUNTY TEEN COURT is an alternative judicial system operated by teen volunteers throughout the community, designed to educate youth and instill responsibility and accountability. Teen defendants who choose Teen Court to satisfy their misdemeanor offenses participate in a "sentencing" trial conducted by volunteer teens before a jury of their peers to determine a sentence consisting of community service, jury duty and other educational tasks that may be accomplished without an expense upon the family.

Wichita County Teen Court was developed through a collaborative effort between the Boys & Girls Clubs of Wichita Falls and the Wichita Falls Junior League in June of 1997 and continues to operate through the Boys & Girls Clubs of Wichita Falls, Inc. All funding comes from grants (government and private), board fundraising endeavors, fees paid by Defendants and private contributions.

- This year, more than 20 youth, recruited from the local community, volunteer to serve as clerks, bailiffs and attorneys Approximately 20 adult professionals from throughout the area participate with the program An average of 300 youth are sentenced each year through Teen Court Greater than 80% of the youth successfully complete all sentencing requirements Within 1 year, after completing the program, less than 20 youth (less than 10%)incur a subsequent offense Of those youth successful in the program, less than 5% each year are referred to the juvenile justice system

While the traditional, original program is designed to assist youth offenders in the community, there is an equal and parallel purpose. All cases are conducted by volunteer youth who are recruited throughout the local school districts and home school programs. Volunteers range in age from junior high students, as clerks and bailiffs, through high school students who participate as attorneys in the program. These volunteers receive hours of training before participating in the trial process. They have traveled to Austin with the purpose of educating officials on their program and issues facing teens. The teens conduct a number of fundraising events throughout the year to pay for these activities.

In December, 2011 the Charlye O. Society was established at Hirschi High School with the sole purpose of curbing school infractions in a peer jury system. These volunteers meet on their lunch break hearing school related offenses before the behavior escalates to a misdemeanor level. School administrators work closely with the program ensuring success and continuation of this endeavor. With the success of the Hirschi Program services were expanded to Barwise Learning Academy. Students and staff have embraced the concept and the program is has finished the second year on camps. As a result of legislation in 2013 affecting misdemeanor offenses on school campuses Teen Court developed a third program that is the "School Court System". Students who commit offenses on a campus that traditionally would have been filed as a misdemeanor offense are now referred to an intervention program that continues to instill responsibility in the student through sanctions set by a peer jury. They are still accountable to their peers and still work to satisfy the sanctions, they just are not formally charged with a criminal offense as long as they comply and meet the terms of their contract they enter into with the school and the Peer





enter into with the school and the Peer Court. If they meet all the terms of their sanctions contract the incident is dismissed.

There are several volunteer opportunities for youth, adults and community professionals. Teens volunteer as attorneys, clerks and bailiffs beginning as young as Junior High level. Adults participate as jury monitors and board members. Community professionals are welcome as board members or preside over Teen Court proceedings.





FOOD RECOVERY: To cut down on food waste, we collect perishable and non-perishable foods from local grocers, companies, and individuals on a regular basis. We process these items to ensure they are safe for consumption and distribute them across our 12 county service area. **(877,038 lbs in 2019)**

CHILDHOOD HUNGER: Food is vital for children to thrive. With Kid's Cafe we provide warm nutritious meals for at-risk children at after school programs **(98,360 meals in 2019)**. With The Powerpak 4 kids Backpack program, we provide a bag full of supplemental, kid friendly food to at risk children at the end of each week. **(56,871 bags in 2019)**

PRODUCE EXPRESS: To combat the lack of healthy options and/or reliable transportation faced by many in need in our area, we send a refrigerated truck, filled with fresh fruits and vegetables to over 24 rural and urban food deserts in our community to give everyone access to healthy options! **(797,630 lbs in 2019)**

MOBILE PANTRY: In partnership with united regional health care system, our mobile pantry helps combat the lack of transportation in urban food deserts in Wichita Falls. We park at 6 locations throughout the month and hand out a box of food and a bag of produce to anyone in need, with united regional providing free health screenings. (77,250 lbs distributed in 2019)

NUTRITION SERVICES: We teach that healthy food can be delicious and inexpensive through both child and adult cooking matters classes. We also offer grocery store tours for tips on what foods to avoid and how to get the most for your money. With our head start classes we give children the opportunity to try foods they may not have had an opportunity to try. **(26 Locations educated)**

SOCIAL SERVICES: Whether it's SNAP, TANF, CHIP, HTW, MEDICAID, or Long Term Care, we help low income families find the help and services they need to keep from going hungry. We provide application assistance from start to finish in both online and offline applications **(641 Individuals assisted in 2019)**

HISTORY: Zavala was founded in 2001 by a group of individuals that recognized the need to develop Hispanic leaders in the Wichita Falls community. After initial meetings, a steering committee was formed in 2002 to discuss ways to engage the Hispanic population in all sectors of community life. Additionally, barriers keeping Hispanics uninvolved were identified and discussed. Our Articles of Incorporation were approved by the state in 2003 and in 2006, Zavala was granted non-profit status and recognized as a 501 (c)(3) not for profit organization.

WHO WE ARE: We are a group of local volunteers who desire to engage the Hispanic community in activities, events, and educational opportunities which will in return create Hispanic leaders who will serve their community.

HOW CAN I HELP? Zavala is currently a United Way partner. We are looking for college mentors to help Café Con leche, a community-oriented organization promote a culture of high expectations for post-secondary education. Amo Leer, a campaign to promote bi-literacy, is a partnership with the Wichita Falls Public Library funded in part by the Priddy Foundation that needs bilingual storytellers. Many community partners and volunteers contribute to the success of our annual Zavala Latin Festival by helping with planning, running a booth or picking up trash. Our cultural programming is recognized again this year with an arts grant award administered by the Alliance for Arts and Culture from the City of Wichita Falls. This funding helps support Zavala International Dance who are always needing more dancers with or without experience. As a result of our programs, there has been an increase in the use of the library by Hispanic families, students taking pre-Advanced Placement courses, and students going to college with financial support.
